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Your REA³D Dollars at Work— Baritone Ukuleles



The Baritone Ukulele Project, funded by a REA³D grant of \$1,000, and a matching grant from Minnesota Power, introduces students to an instrument that they will be able to continue using throughout their lifetime. Baritone ukuleles are easy to transport and relatively inexpensive for students to purchase and play on their own. The baritone ukulele has four of the same strings that are on a guitar, so it promotes an easy transition for students who want to continue learning and growing musically.

The fifteen students involved in the pilot project offer rave reviews for their "uke" experience. Many of them had been interested in the instrument, but did not have the resources (instruments, music, and instructor) before now.

In the future, the goal is to serve additional students in grades 3-5, and some in grades 7-12. Elementary students who learn ukulele basics in grades 3-5 will have the opportunity to pick it up again should they choose to do General Music in 7th/8th grade. There may also be added opportunities for students in high school to use the ukuleles independently, in a secondary music class, or during RAIL Time.

Success story from music instructor Chantelle Anderson: "I began teaching the baritone ukulele after second semester started. The students were very excited as I had been talking about the ukes for months. As we progressed through the book learning individual notes, students began asking about learning chords and playing songs they knew. I began to teach chords along with the notes we were already learning. They struggled at first, but then began to get the hang of it. As they learned more chords, they wanted to play more songs. A true success for the class as a whole came after about a week off from playing the ukuleles. After this week

long break, we started class by going over the chords they had learned before as a refresher for those who may have forgotten the positions. Once students were comfortable, I showed them a song that we had not done before that had a few new chords. They were discouraged at first. We walked through the song so they knew how long to play each chord. I showed them the new chords. Then we practiced that section a time or two. Then we went for it, and tried the entire song. They played it almost perfectly! It was great to see them change from being slightly discouraged to being completely pleased with themselves and their performance!"

PLANNED GIVING-LEAVING A LEGACY

The REA³D Legacy Initiative is made up of individuals and families who have included the Rails Endowment for Academic, Art and Athletic Development in their wills and estate plans. This act of generosity ensures that the giving power of REA³D will be sustained for generations to come.

How Does It Work?

There are many ways to make a lasting gift which helps assure REA³D's operation into perpetuity:

- * naming REA³D in a will or revocable trust agreement
- * listing REA3D as a beneficiary on a retirement account or life insurance policy
- setting REA3D as the payable on death ("POD") designation for financial accounts or stock portfolios.

An example of gift language is:

[the sum, percentage, or description of property] to the Rails Endowment for Academic, Art and Athletic Development, Inc., a Minnesota nonprofit corporation, to be used for its general taxexempt purposes, but without other restriction as to use.

Types of Bequests

Your will can include gifts in the following forms: cash, stock, property (specific or by percentage), real estate (developed or undeveloped), a gift in trust to benefit family members during their lifetimes, with the principal conveyed to REA³D at their passing, or a gift of the remainder of an estate when other specific bequests have been fulfilled.



Luanne Paquette and her husband Bob have included REA³D in their estate planning. Luanne retired from Proctor Public Schools as a Family and Consumer Science Instructor in 2004. She says,

"As we look ahead to the future, we want to empower others to embrace the love of learning."

Are you approaching age 70 1/2 and having to take a required distribution from an IRA?

As many are becoming aware as that numerical event unfolds in

their lives, the government is saying it is time for them to collect their share of the savings that have grown tax free to that time...thus the Required Minimum Distribution (RMD). In most cases, the account holder will notify you of the minimum amount that must be withdrawn and declared as regular income. However, if you choose, any or all of that amount (or more) can be directly given to REA³D as a tax free donation, referenced on your tax form as a Qualified Charitable Distribution (QCD). As REA³D is a qualifying nonprofit organization, we are eligible to receive these gifts. "It's quite simple," recalled Sherm Carlson after requesting a consent form from his investment company. "I simply signed the form, and they made the required direct monetary mailing to the organization I chose." REA³D Funded Boogie Boards Help Students Master Reading and Spelling Challenges

Bay View Reading Intervention Teacher Jessica Kramer says, "The students that I work with in ALL grades love using our new Boogie Boards." We really appreciate the REA³D funding that let us adopt this new technology!

In the students' words, Boogie Boards are awesome because:

- *The markers don't dry up.
- *You will always have a fine tip, not a pushed-in whiteboard marker.
- *It's like an iPad but not an iPad.
- *They erase with the push of a button, like magic!
- *You can write with your finger.

As a teacher, I like the boogie boards because:

- *I can easily write on student boards with my finger; I don't need a separate writing tool.
- *The fine line allows for clear writing.
- *They do not discharge black dust all over hands and table like white boards do.
- *They are easy to clean.
- *They take up less space at my small table than white boards.
- *AND THE BEST ONE.... Students have become more comfortable with errors, because on Boogie Boards, instead of erasing, we draw a single line through any error and keep going. This has been a huge unforeseen benefit, as students can really learn from reviewing their errors, not trying to hide or erase them!

Boogie Board technology provides a new avenue for students to learn sight words using multi-sensory (VAKT-Visual/Auditory/Kinesthetic/Tactile) learning pathways. Students can see, say, hear, and feel the letters in the sight words they write on Boogie Boards. Then, with the push of a button, they are erased and the tablet is ready for the next word. Before boogie boards, this class used white boards and multi-sensory sand during reading intervention groups. This new venue revitalized engagement towards learning these very difficult words.

One of the biggest benefits of Boogie Boards is the better utilization of time. They are a much faster tool than white-boards; there is no need to pass out and collect erasers, whiteboard markers, and boards. This time saving makes big difference for a class that only lasts for 30 minutes.

A \$234 REA³D grant was awarded in January of 2019 for Kramer to purchase six Boogie Boards. She says thirty K-5 students in her Reading Intervention groups have benefitted from using this new technology.
