

### Letter from the President—Sherm Carlson



Sherm Carlson, REA<sup>3</sup>D President

It all started with renting a condo unit during the month of March last spring and introducing myself to the neighbor next door, Dr. Tom Kelly. As author of a rather extensive book on

school reform, I felt compelled to give it some attention, as any future conversations (highly likely) would expose I hadn't read any of it. (It brought back all the anxiety of trying to bluff my way through that oral book report back in high school.)

In his book, Dr. Kelly related the following incident while trying to teach social studies to eighth grade students in the Bronx, N.Y., comprised of 100% economically disadvantaged minority students. Finding that most were reading far below grade level, he switched gears and started teaching his secondary course of study: Reading.

Well, sure enough, in comes the principal to see how his "social studies" class was going, only to discover there was nary a semblance of the material being taught.

asked.

"Because they can't understand social studies," Mr. Kelly replied.

Would you like to teach reading full-time?" pursued the principal.

"Yes, maybe next year my schedule can be changed."

"Why not this year? Just keep teaching reading instead of social studies with your present schedule," the principal concluded without hesitation.

This focus on the importance of reading became the topic of discussion at one of the first REA<sup>3</sup>D board meetings in the beginning of October. By then, it was becoming evident that the Proctor elementary grades would be implementing the hybrid instructional model in accordance with health guidelines. In short, these students would now be limited to only two days of in person direct teacher contact with the remainder of the week being distance learning.

Especially for K-2 primary students, the fear arose that the development of basic reading skills for this population could be in jeopardy. "Let's start someplace," the REA<sup>3</sup>D board concluded, "and see what we can do."

In a little over two weeks, a highly qualified teacher was hired through a REA<sup>3</sup>D grant to provide direct instruction to children in the old hockey arena (now known as the Rails Indoor Facility) which serves as a daycare site for both Pike Lake and Bay View Elementary Schools. The site was in compliance of health directives and the children were already there.

But REA<sup>3</sup>D didn't want to stop there; parents of primary students in "Why are they doing reading?" he the outlying areas might be looking for some extra assistance, as might households in the greater Proctor community. The question was posed, "How about a Monday school as no classes are in session on that day and availability of teachers might be greater?"

> When Grand Lake Township Chairman Duayne Anderson was approached, he could not have been more accommodating in offering the town hall as an outlying site.

Solway Township encouraged bringing forth a similar request if an additional site was needed, with the school district quickly following suit to identify a location in the City of Proctor.

Of course, with any new venture money is essential to ensure sustainability. The REA<sup>3</sup>D board has committed the greater portion of the dollars raised from last winter's REA<sup>3</sup>D by Candlelight dinner to this end, but that will not be enough to carry through the remainder of the year if current conditions continue.

My brain a humid trench of acid, the fear, the hate, the confusion


But I take comfort in the resplendent hope radiating from the citizens of my country. Hope stirs in the scintillating hearts of well meaning Americans.

#### HOW YOUR CONTRIBUTION MATTERS

REA<sup>3</sup>D began fundraising efforts in 2000, starting with a zero balance. Since 2000, the REA<sup>3</sup>D Board of Directors reached out to YOU – local residents, businesses, school district employees, and Proctor Alumni - to fund the REA<sup>3</sup>D mission, to support life-long learning in the Proctor school district communities. In 2007, our fund had grown to \$100,000 and we were able to award grants for academic, art, and athletic projects in our communities. We have awarded nearly \$80,000 to many worthy projects. A donation envelope was not included in our Spring 2020 newsletter, but is included in this fall's postal mailing. With the ongoing pandemic, many may have had economic challenges, and we chose to be sensitive to those situations. Now, we are still amid a pandemic with no immediate end in sight. Our schools have gone to hybrid or on-line learning. Recent grant requests have reflected the need for more support in our schools and communities. Your donations are greatly appreciated and enable our schools, students, and communities to provide the best learning opportunities during this difficult time.



The **REA<sup>3</sup>D Legacy Initiative** is made up of individuals and families who have included the Rails Endowment for Academic, Art and Athletic Development in their wills and estate plans. This act of generosity ensures that the giving power of REA<sup>3</sup>D will be sustained for generations to come.

#### **How Does It Work?**

There are many ways to make a lasting gift which helps assure REA<sup>3</sup>D's operation into perpetuity:

- \* naming REA<sup>3</sup>D in your will or revocable trust agreement
- \* listing REA<sup>3</sup>D as a beneficiary on a retirement account or life insurance policy
- \* setting REA<sup>3</sup>D as the payable on death ("POD") designation for financial accounts or stock portfolios.

#### An example of gift language is:

"I give \_\_\_\_[the sum, percentage, or description of property] to the Rails Endowment for Academic, Art and Athletic Development, Inc., a Minnesota non-profit corporation, to be used for its general tax-exempt purposes, but without other restriction as to use."

REA<sup>3</sup>D can't give you legal advice or tax advice, but we can provide information for you to use in consultations with your attorney and financial/tax advisors. We can also provide you with our federal tax identification number which is necessary in directing bequests. As many are approaching age 70 1/2, you may be aware that the Required Minimum Distribution (RMD) kicks in. If you choose, any or all of the amount you must distribute (or more) can be directly given to REA<sup>3</sup>D as a tax free donation, referenced on your tax form as a Qualified Charitable Distribution (QCD). As REA<sup>3</sup>D is a qualifying non-profit organization, we are eligible to receive these gifts. The donor simply signs a form provided by his/her accountant, attorney or investment advisor. Typically, when people donate to REA<sup>3</sup>D, their contributions go into the REA<sup>3</sup>D fund and only the interest on that money is spent to support grant projects, all of which to date have focused in some way on academics, art and/or athletics. However, given the present pandemic situation, the REA<sup>3</sup>D Board of Directors has made a decision to step up their efforts to support licensed reading instruction for our littlest learners for the first semester of this school year, with the hope of its continuation. With current direct teacher contact being limited to two days a week, REA<sup>3</sup>D seeks to assure that children do not fall behind in the development of this essential academic skill during the pandemic. **Toward this end, the REA<sup>3</sup>D Board voted to use in its entirety, both the proceeds of last winter's Candlelight Dinner event, and new contributions that are made as a result of this mailing, to augment as much as possible, the in-person teaching of reading for K-2 students.** This monetary commitment is far greater than any REA<sup>3</sup>D has awarded in past years, and at present only covers early reading instruction through first semester. Its continuation will depend largely on the contributions made in response to this newsletter, which will be allocated to sustain the program as needed.
